Friday 7th November saw 22 members travel in two minibuses plus a couple of cars to The New Zealand Timber Museum on the outskirts of Putaruru.


From the road, one wouldn't imagine the extensive exhibits that were housed in various buildings at the Museum. We viewed vintage cars, trucks, sawmill, mounted wildlife, a small native bush walk, the original buildings of a jailhouse, Puketuama School and a cookhouse.

We lunched at the Redwoods Café where a good selection of food was available, after which, one bus returned to Taupo, while the other journeyed the short distance into town to 'Over the Moon'. We were met by **Sue Arthur**, who talked us through the methods of making artisan cheese, and the importance of the milk being very fresh, the cheese having the correct smell, touch, feel and PH. The milk was all locally sourced.

We were presented with four different cheeses to taste. Goat's cheese, mild, Southern Cross (made with sheep, goat, buffalo and cows' milk) slightly stronger, Black Truffle Brie, and buffalo/cow blue cheese. The texture of the cheeses was divine. So different from the large, processed cheeses. A place well worth visiting!



We had our "nearly" Christmas function in November. with a lovely "Christmas dinner", served at the Cossie Club, lots of laughter and chat, lots of fun, lots of new friends and old friends, and a general good time was had by all.
