**David Wratt QSO**, is a Climate Scientist who specializes in meteorology and the science and impact of climate change. He has had many roles in NIWA, including years as Chief Climate Scientist and advisory roles for the NZ Govt.

The glaciers are retreating, it is 1% warmer, there is more carbon dioxide in the air, our ocean is more acidic, snow cover is decreased, artic ice is decreasing, the heat in the ocean has increased and the sea level has gone up 20cm. There are climate extremes in every region across the globe. The causes are burning fossil fuels which make the carbon dioxide levels in the atmosphere go up. The greenhouse effect lets the sunshine into the

earth's atmosphere, but it gets trapped. Human influence on the climate system is now an established fact. Extremes have affected agriculture, forestry, and fisheries. We need to stop burning coal and switch away from diesel and fossil gas; plant more trees and improve farming practices; and limit warming to 1.5%.



The school has 400 students which is a huge advantage as there are small classes and everyone knows everyone. A strong school makes a strong community. ## **WEST AUCKLAND MEN'S REBUS CLUB**



When Noel Rose rang and said **Dr Chris Benton**, a retired GP from Whangaparaoa, would be speaking at the October meeting about the **James Webb Space Telescope**, I was blown-away. Noel had once again secured a first-rate speaker with a subject that was going to interest everyone. The James Webb Space Telescope was launched from French Guiana on Christmas Day in 2021, during the next month travelled to its position in space and then unfolded itself. It is a huge structure with a five-

layer sunshade the size of a tennis court (20 m x 14 m) and a primary mirror made of 18 gold covered beryllium segments. The size of the primary mirror is 6.5m in diameter. The position in space where the James West Space Telescope is located is called the Sun Earth-Moon L2 Lagrange point. It is 1.5 million kms away from Earth and is one of five gravitationally stable points in the Sun and Earth-Moon system. A minimal amount of fuel is required to keep objects at the gravitationally stable points. The fuel in the James West Space Telescope thrusters is hydrazine. The first five images from the James West Space Telescope were released on 13 July 2022. They are photos of the Southern Ring planetary nebula; the Carina Nebula; Stephans Quintet galaxy group; WASP 96-b exoplanet; and the SMACS 0723 galaxy cluster. Three are in our home galaxy, the Milky Way, and two are outside the Milky Way. Solar power is used to produce electricity for the spacecraft.

Guest Speaker for October – John Steele. Topic: "Appointment with Dr Arthur Purchas"

John had never heard about Dr Purchas when he was asked by a friend to write his biography. He was also encouraged by others including a historian at Otago who said Purchas was "arguably the most deserving of a full-scale biography but yet to receive one". He was born in 1821 to an architect-engineer father and a mother from a French aristocratic family very involved in social justice. So, a pioneer of NZ abdominal surgery; architect of at least 7 of the Selwyn churches; awarded NZ's very first patent; designed the first Mangere Bridge; discovered 2 new species of animal named after him; founded Choral and Arts Societies, the Auckland Institute/Museum, one of the fathers of the Auckland water system and probably our first

public health expert – this is only half of it. His point of difference is that he was an expert in so many things. He is written about separately and glowingly in our surveying and engineering history, medical and church history, horticultural, geological, and musical worlds. But it was never all joined together. # **SOUTH WAIRARAPA REBUS CLUB**



Members attending our October meeting heard a fascinating address from Joe Howells, one of the principals of Green Jersey Cycle Tours, based in Martinborough, the largest Cycle Hire company in New Zealand. The bulk of their hire market is Martinborough Wine Tourism. Pre-Covid, Green Jersey had organised tours to the south of France with on-the-ground support, reciprocated by GJ in NZ, from a similar cycling organisation in France. Green Jersey are now taking bookings for their cycle tours in France for 2023 and are hoping for reciprocal business.

The main Green Jersey French tour is 16 days riding from the Atlantic Ocean to the Mediterranean, a distance of 750 km, taken at 50 to 75 km per day. All meals and accommodation are booked ahead, luggage transfer and bicycle hire are included in the cost. Often the route follows canal paths, canals from Bordeaux to Toulouse to Agde. France is a very cycle-friendly country with many kilometres of cycle trails. Joe showed us views of tracks, in a wide range of environments, with different surfaces from asphalt to shingle tracks, most being dedicated to both cyclists and walkers. As a result, he became "born again" - as a birdwatcher. He has since hosted thousands of people at the Centre and given hundreds of talks about shorebird migration. He has fostered an intense knowledge of the shorebird migration flyaway and visited key sites in Australia, Alaska, China, and Korea – all the while having a front seat in N.Z. as the Godwit story unfolded. He has published several beautifully illustrated books on the Godwits revealing the story and knowledge of one of the world's most







amazing migrations. The **Shorebird Centre at Miranda** opened in 1990. It is owned and operated by the **Pukorokoro Miranda Naturalists' Trust, founded in 1975, a** Community Facility. Open to the public seven days a week, it is a centre for information, education, and research on shorebirds. Along the road from the Centre, you can find the accessible boardwalks out to three bird hides.
