With so many scungebuckets these days trying to empty your bank account, steal your email address book, or worse, we are all being warned not to open attachments etc. to emails we receive. And it is better to err on the side of caution, as the alternatives can be disastrous.

But be assured: **Jotforms** are a safe and efficient way for Rebus NZ Inc. to communicate with Clubs when clubs/members need to register for something. You can safely click on the link (which appears in blue, something like an email address), and when the **Jotform** appears, you just start typing in the details. When you get to the bottom of the form there is a box marked SUBMIT. When you click on that box you will immediately receive an automatic acknowledgement.

Your Club Officers have all been sent the Jotform link to be completed for the annual re-affiliation process.

Members have also been able to access a Jotform to register attendance at the Annual General Meeting.

At the Board Meeting held on 20th April the subject of Jotforms was discussed, and it was felt that perhaps members need reassurance of the safety of **Jotforms**. The alternative of printing a paper form, filling it in, scanning it, and returning it, (we no longer have a PO Box), and the recipient then having to decipher the writing and enter the details manually into the system, is a much more cumbersome procedure, believe me. Please do not be frightened of Jotforms, they are easy, safe and secure, or Rebus NZ would not use them. Now, *your* news:

In 2005, she was transported by road to Warkworth, where she underwent a meticulous restoration by volunteers and paid workers. They rebuilt her as close as possible to her original appearance. She was fitted with two reconditioned Gardiner diesel motors, manufactured in Manchester in 1958, and was relaunched at Warkworth in 2009. On Wednesday, March 13th, we joined Waitakere Combined



Rebus on a memorable journey down the **Mahurangi River to the Mahurangi Harbour** aboard the Jane Gifford. We passed the derelict **Wilson Cement Works**, established by Nathaniel Wilson in 1878, and **Morrison's Orchards**, established by Edward Morrison in 1873. It was New Zealand's largest producer of fruit and fruit trees until the 1920s, when an alleged fire blight led to the destruction of most of the plantation. *Vince Middeldorp, Secretary.*






REBUS CLUB OF GULF HARBOUR



At the April meeting, **President Ken Daniels** inducted three new members. Welcome to the Club, **Dorte, Rita and Sarah**.

(R) Club Speaker was **Judi Lee** who gave us a picture of her life; being raised on a farm, her love of horses, becoming a veterinarian, and her varied career including working for the NZ Government.



Guest Speaker was Tasman Dowling, a beekeeper/apiarist, who received instruction from a nearby beekeeper, when he was a young boy. In 2008 he started his business during the Manuka honey boom, with 5 hives. There is one Queen to a hive, and the bottom two boxes are brood boxes. He is currently selling 2 tons of live bees to Canada, and specialising in raising Queens. His honey production concentrates on Manuka, Pohutukawa, Pennyroyal and Clover types. Orchardists rent beehives for pollination; avocado orchards use about 500 hives. Kiwifruit growers also rent beehives, which are moved at night. The 80,000 bees in each hive will scout the area, visiting every flower, and mathematically working out distances between pollen sites. The most productive time is November to January, when an average of 69 tons of honey are harvested. Varroa bee mite

arrived in 2001 from China and costs about \$40,000 to treat and control. All honey is tested for American Foul Brood virus. Queens live about 8 years, and can lay 2,000 eggs per day. Worker bees are also female. Drones are males, used for breeding only.

SOUTH WAIRARAPA REBUS CLUB

Members attending the March meeting had their minds stretched by new member and **Guest Speaker**, **Richard Hall**, the **Director of Stonehenge Aotearoa**. Speaking to his fascinating PowerPoint presentation, *Myths and Legends of History*, he challenged many of our pre-conceived notions about historical figures, names, words, and annual celebrations and how they have changed through many centuries. "Virgin" originally meant a high-status woman. Once upon a time "pagan" meant peasant and a "villain" was a village dweller. He also gave examples of the historical movement from predominantly female deities to male deities and religious leaders. The biblical Queen of Sheba was typically depicted by European artists as white-skinned rather than dark-skinned. Christianity got Christmas and submitted to other changes after it became the state religion of the Roman Empire during the early fourth century. Originally, Romans celebrated the birth of Mithra, their sun god, on 25 December. Easter originated as an ancient pagan (peasant) celebration of the spring equinox. The Celtic goddess Brigid, Irish deity of wisdom and healing, could not be rooted out of Irish culture so she was turned into a Christian and adopted as the Catholic Saint Brigid. Richard's presentation proved thoroughly entertaining and informative, and we were left questioning our understanding of the history we thought we knew so well!


REBUS CLUB OF HIBISCUS COAST
