#### **WEST AUCKLAND MEN'S REBUS CLUB**

Charles Nicholls addressed his fellow members with a fact-filled description of the history of **The Alhambra.** "It is more than just a building; it reflects both the light and shadow of humanity. In 2016, my wife Helen and I visited The Alhambra, a monument of Islamic architecture, which stands atop a hill. Its strategic location suggests it was used for defence. In winter, the surrounding hills would be blanketed in snow, providing a vital resource to the hot climate - water. The invaders of 711 were not purely Arab. The



Moors nearly captured half of France before their defeat and retreat. Had they been successful, most of Europe might now be Arab, Muslim, or Moorish. The Moorish invasion of Granada and their interaction with other inhabitants and religions has had a lasting effect on modern-day culture, politics, and society in Spain. Before the birth of Christ, the region was occupied by the Celts, Phoenicians, and Romans. After the fall of the Roman Empire, it was the Christians who took over. The Moors invaded because they saw it as a desirable territory and had conquered large parts of it by 714. The initial invasion was led by a man named Tariq in 711, sent by the Caliph of Damascus to recover estates taken by King Roderic, the Visigoth King who ruled from Toledo. Spain today faces numerous issues, with the Basques wanting to be separatists and people in Valencia and Barcelona often talking about secession from Spain. They struggle with defining what it means to be Spanish." *Vince Middeldorp, Secretary. (This is a brief precis of a seven-page account. Fascinating! Ed.)*

He pointed to the costs of the rites to produce shows, mentioning that **Les Misérables** had cost \$18,000. It is always a gamble that ticket sales will exceed operational overheads. A description of the audition process ahead of any production is particularly interesting, and subsequent rehearsals can take 3-4 months. One show had 20 costume changes per actor, and opening night is always nerve racking. Michael did a millinery course in London in 2019 to assist his costume design

ability. Theatre has been his passion for 50 years.

Club Speaker was Alister Fookes, whose life since the age of nine, has been involved in farming, and farming products, until he and Gill recently retired to the Hibiscus Coast.

He pointed out that while plane crashes are likely to be front page news, few people realized that a ship sinks every two days somewhere in the world and is hardly likely to become news. Martin Connelly, Mayor of the South Wairarapa District Council, was Guest Speaker in April, and he feels that Wairarapa is doing very well. He noted that Wairarapa population is growing older faster than the rest of NZ because of the numbers retiring here. We are quite dependent on immigrants for support of older folk. The new Dark Skies Reserve will be a continuing attraction to the 80% of the world's population who never see stars at home. He noted that the four smaller towns are doing well due to their various local functions and events that attract visitors. Classic car and cycle tours are seen regularly. Martinborough has the Jazz Festival, the Chamber Music Festival and two popular fairs; Greytown has a Mid-Winter festival and an Apple Harvest Festival; Featherston has a Book Town and Karukatea Festival that brings in 8-9000 visitors; Carterton celebrates the summer and winter solstices and Matariki at Stonehenge and has a Yule Festival. Masterton has Wings Over Wairarapa, also the Golden Shears. However, local government is "well and truly busted." Our **Guest Speaker was John Small**, who joined **The Department of Corrections** in 1989, initially thinking of a 2-year stint before moving on. He studied, and eventually became a specialist instructor, in "Controlled Restraint" in which 3 x staff can control a prisoner and keep the facility managed. His current role is as **Residential Manager at Auckland Prison**, **Paremoremo**, the only maximum-security facility in NZ. During his career he has also filled roles as Prison Director at Auckland Women's Prison and Deputy Prison Director at Pare. He talked about the new facilities at Pare – how many prisoners are held in each block and how the system works. He described the behaviour of those who are incarcerated there – mainly those who are "the worst of the worst". He also talked about how they "mix and mingle" the various gang members to ensure no single gang becomes dominant in the prison. He closed by noting that "while some prisoners will remain inside for the rest of their life, most are going to be released".
