



Main Speaker: The main speaker was Ben King, co-founder of **Boxfish Research** and a talented mechanical engineer. His foray into deep sea remote robots came after a career in medical technology and many international postings including a spell with *Medecins sans Frontieres* in Afghanistan. Ben showed remotely operated robots being used for research under many metres of Antarctic ice looking into the habits of class C killer whales, seals, penguins and other aquatic life. Boxfish is based at the old Orakei Dive School with the vision of making advance instruments to be able to see more and go further underwater. Ben himself is an intrepid traveller who has always dreamt of building interesting things and exploring the world. A truly inspirational speaker. *Tania Sweet Newsletter Editor.*

March Guest Speaker, Sam Johnson, Topic: "Student Volunteer Army & the next generation of Volunteers"



Sam described the origins of the Volunteer Army – dealing with rubbish bins in Christchurch on Wednesday nights – the traditional night for students to be in the pubs! This was overtaken by the earthquake and the real volunteer army emerged – a team of 11,000 over 3 weeks to help deal with the aftermath. He subsequently volunteered in Japan after the tsunami with the International Association for Volunteering, working with Government agencies to work with students.

Back in New Zealand he has focused more on primary schools, 30,000 students per annum being shown what can be done – helping with the elderly and conversely older people talking with the young with depression. Another example is the *Farmy Army* – 1 farmer with 10 students clearing rubbish or other tasks. During Covid he found that there was no food delivery service in

the South Island by Foodstuffs. In 2 weeks they developed an end to end grocery delivery service that involved 70 students. Sam has developed the SVA service award concept with certificates across 5 levels based on hours of service from 5 to 250 hours.



CAMBRIDGE MEN'S REBUS CLUB

The Guest Speaker for the April meeting was the **Cambridge Fire Chief, Don Gerrand**. Don has served on the Cambridge volunteer Fire Brigade since 1968 and has been Chief since 1994. Service in the Brigade runs in the family – his father-in-law served with the Brigade for 48 years, son Richard has served for 30 years and grandson Kase joined two years ago. Don outlined the various changes in the governance of the local brigade over the years since its inception in 1904, culminating in the current **Fire Emergency NZ** model. He talked of the difficulties in maintaining sufficient well-trained volunteer crews to respond to call-outs 24/7, noting that the brigade had responded to 395 call outs in 2020 – up from just 66 in 1968. Currently there are 23 volunteers in Cambridge.
